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### **UK Transition From Analogue To Digital Landline Phones**

And What It Means For The Residents Of Sixpenny Handley

As you may be aware, telecoms companies in the UK are replacing the technology they use to provide fixed telephone networks (landlines), which involves replacing copper lines with fibre lines and shifting to digital exchanges. The industry plans to upgrade landline services to new digital technology using an internet connection, such as Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), Digital Voice or All-IP telephony. For most customers, the upgrade is expected to be completed by 2025.



For us in Sixpenny Handley the technology will be available early next year. We are very fortunate to be benefitting from a government contract that will enable local provider, Wessex Internet, to establish a 'fibre to the property (FTTP)' network bringing this new technology directly to your home. This is probably the most significant infrastructure upgrade since the 1900s.

This report aims to explain the implications of this transition for homeowners and businesses within the parish and to inform residents about the available options to transition to a 'digital' telephone service. Please note, you do still have a choice!

### Why is the old network being replaced?

The existing copper-based phone lines, also called 'analogue networks,' have been in use for many years and have become outdated. Sourcing parts for maintenance or repairs has become challenging because suppliers no longer manufacture them. To address this issue, the telecoms industry is transitioning to new digital phone lines known as fibre lines. These modern lines will enable communication providers to deliver clearer and higher-quality phone calls to consumers and businesses.

Additionally, they will introduce new features like anonymous caller rejection and three-way calling.



### What does this mean for me?

The transition to digital phone lines will generally be easy for most consumers, but the exact process may vary depending on your communication provider, typically BT or Openreach, and the equipment they use.

If you already have broadband, the change may just involve connecting your phone to your broadband router instead of the wall socket. Telecoms companies will contact their customers before the migration, so you don't need to do anything until your provider contacts you. Keep an eye out for their correspondence. Broadband customers might already be receiving letters and socket adaptors to connect their phones to their router.

### What if I don't have or don't want to have broadband?

Legislation remains unchanged and ensures that all consumers in the UK will retain access to a landline service if they desire one. For those who don't have broadband or don't want a high-speed internet connection, certain providers will still offer a basic internet connection solely for making calls. This means you can continue to have a landline in your home, but the technology supporting it will change.

If your current telephone service provider cannot offer this or you decide to switch to another provider, you may need to upgrade your telephone handset to a 'digital' telephone, essentially equipped with its own broadband connection.



### **Vulnerable customers**

Ofcom has published a guide to ensure that vulnerable customers are treated fairly and that any at-risk customers are supported.

If you believe you or one of your relatives is a vulnerable customer who depends on a landline, you should notify your/their provider so that they can advise on how the migration could affect you/them.

It is the responsibility of the provider to ensure that those who depend on a landline are provided with a resilient solution that will allow customers to make calls to the emergency services in the event of a power outage and the government is working with Ofcom to ensure this is the case.

# What if I have specific need for a landline or other devices connected to a phone line?

If you are a vulnerable customer and have specific needs, such as having other devices connected to your phone line like alarm systems or fax machines, you can discuss what additional steps or replacement devices or adaptors you need with your telephone provider or equipment supplier.

Current analogue landlines provide low-voltage power from the telephone exchange, allowing handsets to function during power outages. However, digital landlines (typically fibre lines) cannot supply power, so handsets and routers need a backup power source like a battery to work during power cuts. Ofcom requires telecoms companies to ensure uninterrupted access to emergency services even during power outages. They must offer at least one solution that provides access to emergency services for a minimum of one hour during power outages, free of charge, for those who rely on their landline.

For most customers, using a mobile phone as a backup during power outages is recommended by telecoms companies. If

you don't have a mobile or have a poor or no signal, as is the case in some parts of the village, your landline provider should provide a solution such as a battery backup unit, enabling you to make emergency calls during power cuts.

In the UK, national roaming allows emergency calls to be made using any mobile network, even if you're not a customer. Your handset may display "Emergency calls only" in such situations.

If you're uncertain about how a device in your home or business will be affected, it's advisable to contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to determine its compatibility with a digital phone line.

If you're planning to buy a new alarm or device before this change, please make sure that you confirm with the equipment provider that it's compatible with digital phone lines to ensure it remains functional and future-proof.

### What does this mean for my business within the Parish?

The shift to digital landlines will impact all customers, including businesses in the parish. Businesses should plan for a smooth transition to digital alternatives to minimise disruption in 2025.

Landlines are also crucial for various devices like burglar alarms and card payment systems. Since telecoms providers may not be aware of all connected devices, it's essential for businesses to assess their device usage and decide if replacements, upgrades, or adaptors are needed. If you're a business customer and have concerns about the switch to digital phone lines, it's advisable to contact your telecom provider for assistance.



### Upgrading the village's telephone network from Analogue to Digital

The villages' phone network is currently undergoing an upgrade from analogue (copper) to digital (fibre). Wessex Internet

has been contracted to deliver fibre networks in Sixpenny Handley. This will cover over 450 households which is the majority of the village. These fibre lines will be installed but not physically connected unless homeowners order the fibre service from Wessex Internet. This project is expected to commence in December 2023 and conclude in early 2024. Homeowners have the option to switch to the new fibre service or keep their existing arrangements.

# openreach

### Digital switch over deadlines

Openreach has set a deadline of 31
December 2025, for when service providers must migrate most analogue telephone lines to digital phone lines. It is likely that most customers in Sixpenny Handley will transition earlier which, as explained above, will affect your product offerings, so you are encouraged to check with your provider for the available options.

Openreach has stated that once an exchange area is over 75% full fibreenabled, they will cease selling traditional phone line services at fully fibre-enabled premises. This is expected to occur after Wessex Internet has completed installing the fibre network in the village, but no date has been set. To meet the 2025 migration deadline, service providers will be contacting customers in the village to facilitate the switch to digital phone services. If you switch to Wessex Internet's fibre service, you will need a 'digital' telephone service at the time you are changing your broadband to full-fibre broadband.



THE VIEW FROM THE PULPIT Rev Dr David Miell Priest in Charge

**Dear Friends** 

As the days get shorter, we become acutely aware of darkness closing in around us. Sadly, 'dark days' describes not only the season but also the state of our world. So, it is good to remind ourselves that, in the Christian Calendar, this is now the Season of Light. All through December and January, from Advent through Christmas and Epiphany to Candlemas, we celebrate the "the true light, which enlightens everyone, coming into the world" (John 1:9), the light who is Jesus Christ.

This year we light the first Advent Candle on 3 December, adding another each Sunday until the Advent Wreath is completed by lighting a candle on Christmas Day, representing Christ's birth. In the darkest days of winter, the Church proclaims words of hope from the Bible: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness, on them light has shined" (Isaiah 9:2) and "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5).

Imagine the shepherds guarding their flocks in the dead of night: cold, lonely, keeping watch, yet ready to face whatever lurks in the dark. Suddenly, they see - an angel! The glory of the Lord shines around them (Luke 2:9)! And they are terrified - not of the dark but of the light! Too often we'd rather face the terrors of the dark - all

too familiar to us - than the searing light of truth to which the Love of God exposes us. But the reassuring message of the angel to the shepherds, and to all of us, is "Do not be afraid", for this is "good news of great joy for all people" - God is not against us but for us - and "with us" - in the form of this child in the manger, "a Saviour, who is Christ, the Lord". And those who, like the shepherds and wise men, dare to go through the darkness to see for themselves, find it to be true: "Jesus is the light of the world and whoever follows him will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8.12).

### **Our Benefice**

of St Mary's, St Andrew's and St Rumbold's - regrouping news

Our plan is to form two Benefices, the larger one to the south of us with 6 parishes, led by a full-time incumbent. The smaller one with 5 parishes based around Handley with a half-time (actually 0.66) incumbent priest. In this plan, the southern parishes of Pimperne, Stourpaine, Durweston, Tarrants (Hinton, Gunville & Monkton) would form the southern Benefice. In the north, Handley, Pentridge, Chettle, Farnham & Tollard Royal would form the northern Benefice. These are the 11 parishes that David and Henriët

currently support, but they both will leave us for retirement in July 2024. The good news is that the post for our new Benefice was advertised recently and we have at least one applicant. Shortlisting and interviews will follow soon and with luck we may see a new priest here in Handley serving our local parishes by Easter. If anyone has any thoughts or concerns about this, or wishes to input an idea that may be helpful for the challenges we face, please write to notices@handleychurch. org.uk Affordability as always will be key

and for those of you who do not know, we are expected to be able to raise sufficient money locally each year to pay for the majority of the costs of our priest as well as to maintain the fabric of our churches. This is why we are always grateful for any support given. Meanwhile many have assumed that we have no priest, but we do. Our priest in charge for now of course remains Rev Dr David Miell who along with Henriët look after our pastoral needs. They will certainly be working hard for us over the Christmas period.

### WHAT'S BEEN?

In October, it was 'standing room only' at the Chapel of Gussage St Andrew. Over fifty people came to listen to Sue Smith tell us – and show us – about the ways in which traditions of harvest have been recorded in illuminated manuscripts: some of these manuscripts date back over 600 years. Sue's slides showed their astonishing beauty with vivid colours; she described the painstaking methods and the plants used to make those colours. We also learned all sorts of interesting facts, for instance, how our present-day fiscal year of 5 April stems from the church's calendar, albeit a very circuitous route. As usual, when we have such a fund-raising

occasion, food seems to appear without too much prior arrangements – which has slight echoes of the feeding of the five thousand – except in this case, there was very little left over! Our thanks to Sue Smith for her wonderful effort on our behalf; astonishingly the event raised over £700 for both churches.

Remembrance Sunday was, as usual, marked by the whole village. 1st Woodcutts Scout Group followed Veterans and Serving Military Personnel marching up the High Street to the War Memorial. After observing the Two-Minute Silence

at the 11th hour and reading the Roll of Honour, many moved into St Mary's to continue the Service. As well as the Union flag, members from each section of the Scout Group presented their Standards to Rev David Miell who placed them by the altar, together with collages that the Beavers and Squirrels had made out of potato cuts to make poppy prints. A number of young 1st Woodcutts' members participated in the Service which was marvellous to see. There is always something very moving about a flag being very slowly trailed to salute the fallen and Handley marked Remembrance Day with its usual special spirit and dignity.




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### **OUR PARISH LIBRARY**

Royal Air Force A History - Part 3

the fighting petered out and the misery of trench warfare returned.

Reflecting briefly on Major Edward Mannock VC, in the Air Force of today his general state of health would prevent him from becoming a pilot. When war was declared on Turkey, now aligned to Germany, on November 5th, 1914, Edward was employed by the National Telephone Company and had volunteered early in 1914, to work with their operations in Turkey; thus, within days Edward, along with other British nationals, was interned and may well have died such were the appalling conditions in which he was held, but by good fortune his plight was brought to the attention of America's Consular Agent\*[probably based in Constantinople] who attained Edward's release. Owing to his pitiful state his documents were stamped "Unfit for military duties." The privations of internment had left him with defective vision in his right eye, but despite this serious impairment a burning desire to serve the Allied cause he was first accepted into the Royal Army Medical Corps, then by the Royal Engineers until, finally, the Royal Flying Corps.

With scant time to grieve the loss of their commanding officer, No. 85 Squadron soon were heavily committed to what historians refer to as the "One Hundred Days Offensive" with the commencement of the Battle of Amiens.

After four years spent in trench warfare, and with countless setbacks behind them; no one who served on the Western Front, and survived, will forget the horrors of two years previous when on July 1st, 1916, the Battle of the Somme opened with high hope of breaking through the German lines and routing the enemy in one epic battle.

For reasons since explained in numerous books that focus solely on this battle it was not to be and by the end of the opening day 57,000 men from fourteen British Divisions that 'went over the top' were either dead, dying, wounded, missing or captured. It was the darkest of all days in the history of the British Army. Over the next five months [some sources stretch the battle beyond Christmas and New Year] the advance, supported on its right flank by the French, gained ground but at a terrible cost until

As briefly noted in the opening part of this history of the Royal Air Force, the German spring offensive had succeeded in driving a huge gap in a front held by weakened divisions of the Third and Fifth Armies. This was eventually stemmed, but for several months since enemy forces had caused much consternation amongst the Allied generals. Much of their success in these attacks can be attributed to the release of of well trained divisions from the Eastern Front for following the Treaty of Brest-Livvovsk, Russia was to all intent and purpose 'removed' from the war. But throughout the summer the build up of American forces had restored the balance of power along the Western Front and by July 1918, an exhausted enemy was finally halted. Now, rejuvenated French, British and Commonwealth divisions were ready to go over to the offensive.

Alternatively known as the Third Battle of Picardy the Allies struck in dense fog at 04.30 hours on August 8th, 1918. The success achieved in the ground fighting that day, particularly by the Australian and Canadian Corps commanded respectively by Lieutenant-General John Monash and Lieutenant-General Arthur Currie, effectively ended the long years of near stalemate when neither side was able to stamp their authority on the battlefield.

Such was the impact of the opening day that Erich Frederic Wilhelm Ludendorff [architect of the spring offensive] was moved to describe it as "Schwarzer Tag des deutschen Heeren" - the blackest day of the German Army.

In the air the Royal Air Force was fully involved to which their skilled opponents reacted with great vigour. Thus, below the myriad of aerial battles lay a landscaped wreathed in the 'fog of war.' Stripped bare from years of almost continuous artillery bombardment the earth was torn to pieces and within the mass of thousands of shell holes, many filled with an evil-

smelling morass of stagnant water, lay the detritus of war slowly decaying. For the men advancing behind the creeping barrages of fire it was a scene bordering on Armageddon. Rusting entanglements of barbed wire with here and their skeletal remains of some unfortunate solider ensnared in its unforgiving grip; shattered buildings, artillery pieces smashed by the deluge of high explosives that had rained down on their positions and more than a few twisted remains of aeroplanes that had fallen in combat. Before the day was over many more would fly their final sortie.

Supporting the Royal Air Force were three squadrons from the Australian Flying Corps, two equipped with fighters and one engaged on aerial reconnaissance. Such was the intensity of air fighting that when the sun dropped below the western horizon eighty-nine of our aircraft had been brought down, either through enemy action or by the bane of every pilot's life - mechanical malfunction. A ninetieth machine, an Aiirco DH.9 from No. 233 Squadron based at Dover, went down in the Channel following engine failure, its crew, Lieutenant H G Sullivan and 2nd Lieutenant C D Churchill being picked up unharmed by their experience.

These were the heaviest losses sustained since formation on April 1st, 1918. All are identified between pages 113 and 126 of my second volume devoted to Royal Air Force squadron losses. For a mere 'snapshot' I recount the fate of two crews, both from No. 5 Squadron equipped with RE.8 two-seater reconnaissance machines. Operating from Bovelles the squadron commenced flying as soon as the fog lifted. For Lieutenant F C Russell and his observer, Lieutenant Lewis John Francis Oertling, they were tasked with working with artillery batteries firing on enemy positions and while doing so they came under attack from an enemy scout. With his RE.8 shot through in numerous places Russell managed to crash-land behind enemy lines. He survived to become a prisoner of war but Lewis Oertling was fatally wounded; he now rests in peace at Vignacourt

British Cemetery, some 16km northwest of Amiens, while 28km southeast of Amiens at Caix their squadron colleagues, Lieutenants Arnold Derham Robinson and Arthur Charles Southeron-Estcourt, a graduate from Magdelen College, Oxford, and a holder of the Military Cross, fell to their deaths. I have little doubt their bodies were recovered by a unit from the Canadian Corp who captured the village of Caix on the first day of the battle. Both were buried in Caix British Cemetery.

Please remember, if you are doing your own online tax return these must be submitted to HMRC (HM Revenue & Customs) by 31st January 2024 for tax year 2022/23. The deadline for sending paper Returns closed on 31 October 2023.

### **Current State Pension Age**

The second review of the State Pension age has been published by the Department for Work and Pensions. The State Pension age is currently 66. The review has stated that a further increase in the State Pension age to 67 for those born on or after April 1960 will take place as planned between 2026 and 2028. Following this announcement, the government has confirmed the State Pension age will rise to 67 by the end of 2028.

The Pensions Act 2014 requires the Secretary of State for Work and Pensions to regularly review the State Pension age. There had also been plans for a further gradual rise in the State Pension age to 68 between 2044 and 2046 for those born on or after April 1977. The government plans to have a further review within two years of the next Parliament to reconsider the rise to age 68.

This will ensure that the government is able to consider the latest information to inform any future decision on the State Pension age. This will include life expectancy and population projections, the economic position, and the impact on the labour market.

The government has said they remain committed to the principle of providing 10 years notice of changes to State Pension age, enabling people to plan effectively for retirement. All options for the rise to the State Pension age from 67 to 68 that meet the 10 years notice period will be in scope at the next review.

Christmas is almost upon us again and the winter months bring long dark nights and the need for increased vigilance, especially over the Christmas and New Year period, when many of us will be out celebrating with family, neighbours and friends. Do ensure you lock your home securely when you go out, even if only for a short while, and that curtains are drawn and some lights left on. In particular, do not leave Christmas presents where they can be seen from outside.

If you are going away over the festive season, you may wish to alert your neighbours that the house will be empty and ask them to keep an eye on your property. Equally, even if you have not been specifically asked to watch out for your neighbours, please be vigilant and report anything suspicious to the Police. If we all stay alert to the increased risk of opportunistic crime, we can help deter the ill-intentioned and keep our community safe.

Although the weather has been remarkably mild through the autumn, it will very likely turn colder over the coming weeks. Given the high price of energy and the ongoing cost of living issues, please look out for any

elderly/vulnerable neighbours as they tend to be more susceptible to the cold. It will only take a moment or two to check that all is well with them every now and then.

Police resources are always scarce and tend to be concentrated in the more heavily populated urban areas. However, the rural crime team in Dorset has been strengthened recently and we can help it to get a clearer picture of any problems affecting our community by reporting even relatively minor incidents. In an emergency, or if you see a crime being committed, you should dial 999; other incidents can be reported to the Police by dialing 101.

Given the ongoing problem in the local area of theft from unattended vehicles, please avoid leaving anything of value in your car, especially when such items are clearly visible. Finally, remaining with the subject of vehicles, please take every precaution driving in winter conditions, when visibility can be poor and braking distances much increased by slippery road surfaces. Allow extra time for your journeys and remember it is better to arrive a little late than not to arrive at all.

Depending on the circumstances,
National Insurance credits may be applied
automatically or an application for credits
may be required. There are two types of
National Insurance credits available, either
Class 1 or Class 3. Class 3 credits count
towards the State Pension and certain
bereavement benefits whilst Class 1 covers
these as well as other benefits such as
Jobseeker's Allowance.

Taxpayers may also be able to pay voluntary contributions to fill any gaps if they are eligible.

### Do You Need To Pay Tax When You Sell Your Home?

In general, there is no Capital Gains Tax (CGT) when you sell your home. This applies to a property which has been used as the main family residence. An investment property which has never been used as your own home does not qualify for relief. This relief from CGT is commonly known as Private Residence Relief.

Taxpayers are usually entitled to full relief from CGT where all the following conditions are met:

1. The family home has been the taxpayer's only or main residence throughout the period of ownership.

2.The taxpayer has not let part of the house out - this does not include having a lodger.

3.No part of the family home has been used exclusively for business purposes (using a room as a temporary or occasional office does not count as exclusive business use).

4.The garden or grounds, including the buildings on them, are not greater than 5,000 square metres (just over an acre) in total.

5. The property was not purchased just to make a gain.

If a property has been occupied at any time as an individual's private residence, the last 9 months of ownership are disregarded for CGT purposes – even if the individual was not living in the property when it was sold. The time period can be extended to 36 months under certain limited circumstances. There are also special rules for homeowners that work or live away from home.

Married couples and civil partners can only count one property as their main home at any one time.

### **Tax Free Annual Party**

The cost of a staff party or other annual

entertainment is generally allowed as a deduction for tax purposes. If you meet the various criteria outlined below, then there is no requirement to report anything to HMRC or pay tax and National Insurance. There will also be no taxable benefit charged to employees.

An annual Christmas party or other annual event offered to staff generally is not taxable to those attending provided that the average cost per head of the function does not exceed £150.

The event must be open to all employees. If a business has multiple locations, then a party open to all staff at one of the locations is allowable. They can also have separate parties for separate departments, but employees must be able to attend one of the events.

There can be more than one annual event. If the total cost of these parties is under £150 per head, then there is no chargeable benefit. However, if the total cost per head goes over £150 then whichever functions best utilise the £150 are exempt and the others taxable. Note, £150 is not an allowance and any costs over £150 per head are taxable on the full cost per head.

It is not necessary to keep a running total by employee but a cost per head per function. All costs including VAT must be considered. This includes the costs of transport to and from the event, food and drink and any accommodation provided. It is highly recommended when planning a staff party or other annual event to try and stick to the tax rules above. This should ensure that your party does not have an extra tax cost for you or your employees. We wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a Prosperous 2024!

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### Sixpenny Handley Road Sign

Recent work by Dorset Council in clearing undergrowth to the side of the highway revealed the dilapidated road sign, as shown in the photograph above, at the foot of the hill as you enter Sixpenny Handley. The sign is one of an original 1960's vintage constructed of cast aluminium, with raised lettering, pointing the way to Shaftesbury, Bowerchalke and Blandford. Because Dorset Highways no longer maintain these signs (nor the fingerpoint signs which can be seen around the village), your Parish Council agreed to fund its restoration.

Accordingly Councillor Stuart McLean, greatly assisted by Mr Richard Jesse of the Sixpenny Handley Forge, who generously offered his professional services at no cost, removed the sign, arranged for it to be sand blasted, painted white and letters picked out in black. As you can now see the sign has been relocated in its original position. These signs are rare because of the nature of their construction in that many were

stolen for the value of the aluminium, of which they had been originally cast.



The renovated sign, seen here after its replacement by Stuart McLean and Richard Jesse, now stands proudly and fully visible at the foot of Handley Hill for all to see. The Parish Council is most grateful to Mr Jesse for his generous support in ensuring the renovation of this attractive and unusual sign.

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### **Allotment Diary**

It's that time of year when you look back over the growing season. This year has been quite productive despite the cold winds during March and April and a soggy soggy August. We had salad crops during the summer, as well as plentiful potatoes, spinach, courgettes, French and runner beans amongst others, which has been a pleasant surprise bearing in mind the dire warning on taking on an allotment at Common Road with its hard ground full of flints.

We've always enjoyed fresh home grown veg, so last year we decided to give it go. We had an allotment some years ago and enjoyed cultivating the soil by digging and enriching it with well rotted manure/ compost, but digging the ground was always hard work. So this time, in view of the soil conditions we decided to go down the route of No Dig as seen on TV (Gardeners World) and various YouTube channels\*. It's easy they say, all you need is some brown cardboard and some compost. We were sceptical about the principle of No Dig which seemed to go against the grain of years of traditional thinking and the associated toil and sweat! However, in the face of adversity and a plot full of flints, it was worth a try.

We were fortunate that a plot became available with a few raised beds already in place, so we collected cardboard and made a visit to Newbourne Farm Composting recommended to anyone with a childhood love of Tonka toys and megatractors. Monstrous yellow diggers build stacks of green waste the height of a house, which steams for weeks decomposing before being graded into usable garden compost. We bought 10 bags of the stuff, laid it on the cardboard and hey presto, a few weeks later it was ready to sow. No digging, no weeding, just strim between the beds and watch your garden grow. Well not quite, but No Dig certainly takes the hard work out of it.

The theory behind No Dig is that there is a complex soil structure beneath our feet with all sorts of microbiolgical bugs and worms and processes.\*. Digging is said to be rather like an earthquake in this microbiological community, from which

the soil struggles to recover. Instead of digging, a layer of compost can be added to the healthy soil without disrupting its structure, to allow healthy plants to grow without the need for pesticides, herbicides or other chemicals, or the need for animal or artificial fertilizers.

The beauty of this approach is that the veg we grow is entirely organic, it helps keep our carbon footprint down - and the added advantage in one's advancing years is the lack of physical effort. Whilst many people already grow their own veg, not everyone has room for a vegetable garden. There are a few allotments free at the moment and we would encourage anyone keen to enjoy their own fresh, organic vegetables to give No Dig a go. The prospect of taking on an allotment can be daunting, but a half-plot or even a quarter-plot could be an option for those with limited time to spare. There are always fellow allotmenters happy to provide advice and support. If you are interested you should contact Ciona, at the Parish Office or the allotment secretary, Steve Barrett. 
### Police Grant - 2024 Activity Day

### Osprey Round Isle of Wight

Regular readers will recall report of 2018 Gull Osprey RIoW, where 'Ayers & Graces' was requested to be 'mother ship' in support of an Osprey race, to celebrate Ian Proctor's (the designer) centenary year. Once again we were called upon, to celebrate the Osprey 70th anniversary with another RIoW race for Ospreys and acting as 'mother ship' again.

We had on board experienced Osprey sailors, photo shoot team, and race organiser. Bit of an early start, with a clear sky, and fantastic display of stars as we set off down river. As Ospreys also sailed down river, a photographers dream, with Ospreys sailing through the red orb of a rising sun. The Osprey dinghy is 17'6" in length, and raced by helm and one or two crew, though one is more usual. Sail wardrobe is main, large genoa, and symmetrical spinnaker. Crew ride a trapeze.

The race is anti clockwise round the Island,

a distance of some 60 miles, which calls for stamina and endurance from helm and crew. The course is quite simple, a start off Lymington River, Needles to port, Bembridge Ledge buoy to port, finish in Lymington river. But of course varying wind strengths and direction, fair and adverse tidal streams, to cope with. Racing was incredibly close, with much changing of position as the race progressed, and helms choosing different tactics.

To mark the occasion for us we were given a copy of the 'Osprey 70th Anniversary' book, which makes fascinating reading, charting progress from 1953 to present day, and Ospreys mark 1 to mark 6, www. ospreysailing.org is well worth a look. And the skipper and me are mentioned in dispatches!

### **Towards Freshwater Bay**

A favourite easy destination, when wind and tide serve, is Freshwater Bay, down Needles Channel, turn to port at Needles (avoiding the wreck close in, which catches



a few out during Round Island Race!). sail into the bay, and anchor for lunch. Difficult holding as, I think, a rocky bottom, the anchor bouncing a bit before holding. A few interesting things to observe; often a Spitfire flying round the Island (cost about £3k, they say), also strange flying antics by old Boeings, flying low over the water and in an oval circuit, our on-board Air Traffic Controller, advised that these were out of Cardiff Air Port and probably practising oil spillage remedial procedures.

There is something about those comfortingly familiar words that bears contemplation. 'They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old' is the stated determination of survivors of the Great War never to forget their fallen comrades - not for a day - hence 'at the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them'. Even a hundred years later we retain their present tense - 'we that are left...' and I pondered on this.

It is not possible of course to 'remember' an event that one has not experienced. Even to imagine what others must have experienced is almost impossible; I try to remember the uncle that I never met, my mother's elder and much loved brother,

Alexander. There are family photos of him of course, but all before the age of 25. He served in the South African Air Force and was lost at sea on a reconnaissance flight over the South Atlantic. Did he suffer engine failure, or run out of fuel? Was he shot down? Did he and his crew man survive for a few ghastly days in a life raft without any hope of rescue? It will never be known. He left a wife and a young son and his name is inscribed on the war memorial at El Alamein dedicated to all those who gave their lives in Africa in WW2.

I try to imagine service in the trenches, but again it is quite impossible. I have never felt really cold, soaking wet and hungry, not Arctic convoy cold, life boat cold, Stalingrad cold. I just remember my father describing a freezing Korean winter when his company cook had to apply melted butter to their toast with a shaving brush that he kept for the purpose.

I have lived in the tropics but I have never experienced days and days on end carrying rifle and pack

in the clothes-rotting humidity of a mosquito and leach infested Burmese jungle; nor the merciless sun-scorched, sand blown, gritty heat of North Africa.

I have felt brief moments of alarm, the adrenalin rush of a near miss while driving too fast or the odd moment when sailing in rough weather; never the weeks-long dread of torpedo attack on the merchant convoys; never the prolonged and repeated exposure to mortal danger of the fighter pilots

or the long range bomber crews, nor the daily morale-sapping fear of stepping on an IED in

Afghanistan.

I have no experience of the horrors of war. What I know of such things has been absorbed in comfort and safety, from history books and documentary films.

As one born soon after the end of the Second World War, I am one of a lucky generation to have enjoyed the relative peace of the ensuing seventy years, though that is not to forget that it has been rare indeed for a year to pass without our armed forces suffering at least some casualties, often many. One thinks of Korea, Northern Ireland, the Falklands, the two Gulf wars and Afghanistan to name just a few. And that, I realise, is why in spite of the emphasis on, and the origin of our Remembrance in the Great War, we still quite rightly voice those immortal words in the present tense.

And so, during those two long, sad, silent minutes, thankful that I have never myself experienced war, I ponder with enduring gratitude on the sacrifice of all, including those of more recent generations, who 'shall not grow old'; those whose remembrance must never be forgotten.

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# Digital Switchover Scams

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and 2025 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines to new upgraded landline services using digital technology. Services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones and healthcare devices will be switched over. The new network will provide a future proof, more reliable and dependable broadband service.

The Local Government Association (LGA) says the change will be straightforward for most people. However, they have warned that criminals are using misinformation about the switchover to confuse people vulnerable to scams.

The LGA says people who use healthcare telephony devices are particularly at risk of being targeted by scammers, who trick victims into disclosing their personal and financial information over the phone.

Around 2 million people use these devices across the country. The switchover is free of charge and councils and their homecare alarm providers or contractors will never ask for personal or financial information over the phone.

The LGA says it has seen reports of fraudsters calling people claiming their bank details are needed as part of the switchover or their service will be disconnected. It has also received reports of residents being contacted over the phone by callers claiming to work for the NHS, asking for their personal information. Telecoms providers such as Virgin Media, O2 or BT should contact customers before the switchover to check in to make sure their service isn't affected.

Anyone with telecare services should check how the switchover will affect them. Seen a scam? Report it to Action Fraud online or by calling 0300 123 2040.
